Using Adobe Creative Cloud Express and other tools to help create engaging course materials and assignments

Adobe's Creative Cloud suite has become industry standard for creative professionals across a broad variety of disciplines – however, we rarely see it applied in the classroom outside of classes dedicated to its programs, which is a shame because versions of these tools have fantastic applications in both creating classroom materials and as a tool for students to create assignments.

This is where [Adobe Express](#) comes in.

Adobe Express is a browser-based set of tools that let you use some of the most commonly used features of programs like Photoshop, Illustrator, and even Adobe's video editing software – it is a powerful and easy-to-use tool!

Creating memorable and effective course materials

Multimodal course materials such as narrated slideshows, short videos, and infographics can help build engagement and understanding in students. These sorts of materials are a natural fit for asynchronous, online, or hybrid courses – but they can also be fantastic supporting materials for in person-classes as well.

Infographics in particular are a great way to convey complex information to students in a way that is both simple and memorable, whereas narrated videos can serve as a fantastic resource that students can return to for short reminders on specific course topics when it's time for them to complete an assignment or study for a test.

One of the easiest ways to incorporate Adobe Express into your course design is to use it to create course materials. Adobe Express has many streamlined tools and thousands of templates make it easy to create engaging documents for students – everything from graphics, to videos, to audio.

Having students complete multimedia assignments

When given the option to submit an assignment in a more creative medium, students have been shown to have better knowledge retention, higher engagement, and an overall more positive feeling toward the course.
