Maintaining Academic Integrity in Online Tests and Exams

As you map out the remainder of your courses for Winter 2020 and begin delivering the content in an online environment, you may find yourself in a situation where you are creating online tests and examinations. The Teaching & Learning Centre encourages the use of the following online testing strategies that promote academic integrity:

- Clearly communicate expectations for students on online tests.
- Be explicit about what constitutes collaborative group work and what is individual work.
- Provide clear instructions on how online tests should be taken. Keep the timeframe for accessing the test short, but reasonable.
- Design questions to suit an open-book style of testing.
- Randomize the order of questions.
- Display questions one at a time and prohibit back-tracking in the test.
- Be available to answer questions related to the test.
- Debrief online tests/quizzes with students to assess the knowledge of what they have submitted.

Shift Happens article

The International Centre for Academic Integrity (ICAI) held their annual conference in early March in Portland, Oregon. A delegation of four from Seneca attended and presented their journey on shifting the culture of academic integrity college-wide. The Seneca delegation included Laurel Schollen, Vice President Academic, Amy Lin, Director of the Teaching & Learning Centre, Kathryn Klages, Manager of Library Literacies & Outreach, and Charanpreet Deu, President of the Seneca Student Federation.
